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#### **Message from the Executive Chairperson:**

Madam President and Members of the Legislature:

I extend thanks to you, Madam President, the Speakers and members of the Legislature, and our international partners for the enormous support to the Commission.

During this period, the Liberia Anti-Corruption Commission implemented series of program activities gear towards meeting its mandate. Theseimplemented program activities witnessed some challenging moments which we hope can be overcome in the coming year.

We entered the LACC with a clear vision of rebranding the institution to enhance its credibility as a professionalized anti-graft institution. The Commission is measuring up to best practices, and wants to perform to the expectation of the Liberian people.

To achieve this, I urge all of us to own this endeavor of creating an enlighten environment on corruption; our collective leadership and courage is overwhelmingly needed now than ever in the history of our country. The expectations of our citizens are high; more is anticipated of us as leaders; the time is now, let's support each other in this fight against corruption, collaborate and we can make great strives and deliver on aggregate preference of the governed. This report is reflective of some of the major successes of the Commission in its thematic areas of Investigation & Prosecution; Education & Prevention; and Administration including capacity building and collaboration with partners.

#### 1.1 Investigation:

This matrix reflects the number of cases reported to LACC; number of cases investigated and recommended to the Ministry of Justice for prosecution based on merits, including those retrieved after the ninety days period.

## Cases recommended to the Ministry of Justice (MOJ) for prosecution

#### 1.1 Prosecution

During the period under review, the Commission recommended a total of eight (8) cases to the Ministry of Justice for prosecution. They include:

- 1. Allegation of bribery at the National Oil Company of Liberia (NOCAL) involving some lawmakers;
- 2. Allegation of corruption at the National Commission on Higher Education (NCHE);
- 3. Allegation of corruption involving the Ministry of Public works and Flashpoint Incorporated;
- 4. Allegation of corruption relating to the Japanese Oil Grant of 2011 between the governments of Japan and Liberia, with the complicity of Aminata and Son, Incorporated;
- 5. Allegation of forgery and deception involving DONKAN/MOF/MOD and the Senate;
- 6. Allegation of impropriety and violation of the Budget and Public Financial Management Law involving the Speaker of the House of Representatives and Representative Adolph Lawrence;
- 7. Allegation of improprieties in the administration of the County Development Fund in Sinoe County; and

8. Allegation of impropriety in the usage of the County Development Fund of Grand Kru County (this case was dropped because it lacks the merit and evidence that a wrong was committed)

#### **Verdicts:**

During the period under review, two cases recommended for prosecution were tried by the Criminal Court and verdicts announced are contained below:

- 1. On 8<sup>th</sup> January 2015, the Honorable Supreme Court of the Republic of Liberia ruled in favor of LACC/GOL and mandated the re-instatement of a unanimous Guilty Verdict against defendants Beatrice Munah Sieh Brown, former Inspector General of the Liberia National Police, Harris Mannah Dunn, former Deputy Director for Administration, Liberia National Police and Prince A.O Akerimi, Proprietor, Ultimate Investment & Holding Company for willfully, criminally and intentionally converting funds for the procurement of uniforms for the Emergency Response Unit (ERU) of the Liberia National Police into the own use; and
- 2. During the period under review, the LACC collaborated with the Ministry of Justice, to prosecute defendant Wesley S. Jlue, former Finance Officer of the National Drug Service, at the Criminal Court "C". He was convicted for Theft of Property and Forgery. Defendant Jlue has taken an appeal to Supreme Court in exercise of defendant's right to appeal as guaranteed under the law.
- Additionally, LACC and Ministry of Justice collaborated and prosecuted Moses Wongbeh, former MD, FDA; John Kantor, former Technical Director; Janga Kamara, David Blayee and Maxwell Gwee, FDA for Economic Sabotage; Criminal Conspiracy; forgery; Counterfeiting; obtaining and issuing Deceptive written instruments. The
  - Court ordered restitution in 6 million USD; fined each defendant 10 thousand United States dollars; and sentenced each defendant to 10 years imprisonment. An appeal was announced by the defendants.

#### **Restitution:**

Based on findings from investigations conducted, the below listed institutions were held liable for different wrong doings, and requested to restitute varying amount of funds into government coffers. The institutions include:

- 1. Aminata and Son incorporated-restituted sixteen thousand USD (\$16,000 ) from the implementation of the Japanese Oil Grant; and
- 2. International Bank Liberia Limited restituted LRD\$ 80, 572.00 for payment of unauthorized GoL Civil Servant cheques.
- 3. Liberia Bank for Development and Investment, restituted LRD\$84,668.88

  Other institutions expected to restitute funds include:
- 1. First International Bank Limited, requested to restitute seventeen thousand, four hundred and twenty Liberian Dollars(LRD\$17, 420.00) for payment of authorized GoL Civil Servants payroll checks;
- 2. Ecobank Liberia Limited, requested to restitute LRD\$448,249.02 for payment of authorized GoL Civil Servants payroll checks; and
- 3. Central Bank of Liberia, requested to restitute LRD\$4,955,402.09 for payment of authorized GoL Civil Servants payroll checks.

#### Education & Prevention:

- 4. Four hundred and eighteen (418) Public officials declared their assets to the Commission, representing 24 government ministries and agencies;
- 5. The LACC during the period under review started the full implementation of an Assessment Framework and the development of Integrity clubs in ten (10) public secondary schools across five counties namely: Montserrado, Grand Bassa, Margibi, Bong and Bomi Counties; and

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#### **Other Achievements:**

- 1. Finalized, signed and launched LACC three years Strategic Plan;
- 2. Launched monitoring exercise on the management of resources provided by the Government and its partners in the fight against Ebola;
- 3. Enforced Assets Declaration regime for officials required by Executive Order, recommended suspension and non-payment of one month salary for those in violation; recommendation honored and effected by the President of Liberia.

#### **International Representations:**

a. Represented Liberia and the LACC at UNCAC's Fifth Implementation Review Group Session in Vienna, Austria;

- b. As a direct result of this representation, Liberia was peer reviewed from Feb. 10-12, 2015 in Vienna. A delegation of two experts left Liberia for Vienna on Feb, 5 2015.
- c. Liberia and Peru peer reviewed Djibouti

The LACC however, still faces a number of challenges. The shortage of prosecutors has limited the Commission's ability to move aggressively with cases.

This problem is compounded by the absence of key legal instruments such as the Corrupt Offences Act and the Illicit Enrichment Act.

The lack of support and fierce opposition occasioning the LACC's investigation, reports, etc., particularly from key government institutions is disturbing and perpetuate the distrust of Government's collective resolve and commitment to combat corruption. This is especially evident with the leadership of the Lower House of the Liberian Legislature and some Ministries, Agencies and Commissions of the Executive branch.

As we proceed into 2015/2016, the Commission sees more pressing moments ahead as it seeks the continued support of all in ensuring the full implementation of the LACC's mandate.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The Liberia Anti-corruption Commission is under obligation to report to the President and National Legislature on the activities of the Commission. The Annual Report of the Commission summarizes the Commission's activities for the period, July 2014-June 2015. The report captures the work of all Divisions within the Commission for the period under review. It brings into focus the main accomplishments and challenges facing the Commission as it implements its mandate under the Anti-Corruption Act of August 2008.

The reporting period witnessed the Commission handling a number of cases of alleged corruption both in the public and private sectors that are linked to the abuse of public resources through the involvement of private entities. The Commission is currently working on Twenty-six (26) cases\_involving institutions and individuals in the Country that are either affected by the alleged acts of corruption, or in some cases are beneficiaries.

The Commission has seen an upsurge in complaints filed by walk-in sources or tip-offs. Most of these cases are under full investigation and the Commission will continue to report as these cases are concluded.

The Commission is also pleased to report, during the period under review, (July 2014-June 2015) four hundred and eighteen (418) public officials declared their assets to the Commission. The Commission is currently instituting mechanisms to start the verification of those assets, an exercise that was suspended when we took over the affairs of the Commission to review the preceding exercises before authorizing continuation.

The Commission under the current reporting period worked to strengthen the capacity of the Education and Prevention Division. We are convinced that a strong prevention mechanism will support overall anti-corruption efforts and will help the government savemore resources without going through long and witty processes of investigating and prosecuting.

To strengthen its prevention efforts, the Commission completed Mapping of Corruption Risk in the Water and Sanitation Sector of the Country. This program will promote accountability and integrity in the water and sanitation sector across the Country. The resultant report, according to plan, has been validated with a recommendation for the establishment of a Ministry of Water. Besides, a risk reduction plan has been prepared and the LWSC is expected to pilot same, while monitoring will be conducted of the implementation by the LACC.

The Commission is also working along with the UNDP's Strengthen Accountability, Oversight and participation (STAOP) Project on strengthening the capacities of integrity institutions. A National Consultant is presently conducting an assessment amongst integrity institutions of Liberia's compliance with the protocols of the UNCAC.

Under the STAOP project also, ten thousand copies of an Act of the National Legislature of the National Code of Conduct have been printed awaiting distribution throughout the country. A Code of Conduct (CoC) Technical Implementation Committee chaired by the LACC has drafted an Asset Declaration Regulation to guide asset declaration.

The Commission has also been solidifying its administrative structure to enhance its operational skills to deliver value for money to customers (the Liberian people). During the period under review, the Commission prepared and submitted its first quarterly IPSAS Financial Statement to the Ministry of Finance and Development (MFDP). It has also been strengthening its internal controls including the modification of existing policy instruments as well as drafted and finalized new ones as below:

- 1. Handbook for Employees;
- 2. Financial Handbook;
- 3. Transport Policy
- 4. Storeroom Policy
- 5. ICT Policy;
- 6. Procurement Policy;
- 7. Audit Charter; and
- 8. Risk Management policy
- 9. Conduct of regular risk assessment within the Commission.

On the LACC's request, the General Auditing Commission (GAC), the auditing arm of the Government of Liberia, has conducted its first audit of the workings of the LACC for the periods 2010/2011, 2011/2012, and 2012/2013.

#### 1.1 FINANCIAL MATTERS

According to section 12.1 of the LACC Act, the LACC shall be financed through the National Budget by Legislative appropriations. It shall be the responsibility of the Chairperson to ensure that the annual budget is prepared and submitted in time to appropriate agencies of government. Section 13.1 also says the Commission shall enjoy independence in all its operations including financial autonomy and operational independence.

The Commission is pleased to acknowledge the demonstrated commitment of the Government of Liberia to support the fight against corruption. During the period under review, the Commission received a total of United States Dollars Two Million, Eight Hundred Twenty Nine Thousand, Six Hundred Ninety One (\$2, 829, 691); Eight Hundred Thirty One Thousand Eight Hundred Sixty Two United States Dollars (\$831, 862) in excess of its FY 2014/2015 approved budget (1,997, 829). The additional disbursement was given to further support the enforcement and prosecution programs of the Commission.

#### 1.2 Outline of the Year

This annual report revolves around many areas of the Commission's work. In this report, we consider the achievements, progress and other factors standing in the way of implementing the Commission's mandate. This report focuses on issues of enforcement and Investigation, Preventions and the General Administrative Framework of the Commission.

#### 1.3 Achievements:

Despite the Ebola situation, the Commission achieved some successes in what could possibly be the most difficult year (2014/2015):

- The period under review saw the Commission handling eleven (11) cases. This
  number represents an almost 55% reduction in the cases the LACC handled in
  the immediate past reporting year. The dollar value of these cases are in the
  tune of Three million, Four Hundred Sixty Four Thousand, Two Hundred Twenty
  United States Dollars (USD\$ 3,464,220.00).
- The LACC during the period under review started an initiative with government Ministries and Agencies receiving Ebola resources in the country. The

Commission through its Division of Prevention and Education worked with ten (10) institutions in monitoring the use of Ebola resources.

• The Commission during the period under review procured a Staff Bus and four additional vehicles for its Vice Chairperson and other Commissioners.

#### II. ENFORCEMENT

The Enforcement Division is one of the most important arms of the Commission. It is charged with managing the investigative, prosecutorial and legal functions of the Commission.

#### 2.1 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS/EFFORTS DURING THE PERIOD UNDER REVIEW

During the period under review, the Division experienced a work load of eleven (11) cases. In monetary terms, these cases are worth Three Million Four Hundred Sixty-four Thousand Two Hundred Twenty United States Dollars (\$ 3, 464,220). These cases include complaints from individuals on corruption allegations of amounts ranging from Fifteen Thousand United States Dollars to a mega amount of Two Million Nine Hundred Nineteen Thousand Two Hundred Twenty United States Dollars (\$ 2, 919,220).

The Commission is pleased to report that ten (10) cases were successfully investigated and concluded. The Commission is gratified that complaints are coming from whistleblowers or tip-off from individuals who feel offended by corrupt practices in all sectors of the country.

The Commission during the period under review withdrew four (4) cases from the Ministry of Justice that have stayed over the statutory ninety (90) days. The cases are:

- Liberia Marketing Association;
- Close Circuit TV;
- Ministry of Finance & Development Planning Phases 1; and
- Ministry of Finance & Development Planning Phases 2

During the period under review, the Enforcement Division received a total of twelve cases (12), while ten cases (10) were brought forward from the first quarter; thus amounting to Twenty Two cases (22) valued at over Ninety Million United States Dollars

(USD 90 Million) and over Four Million Liberian Dollars (LRD 4 Million) for the reporting period.

Of the Twenty Two cases (22), fourteen (14) cases are ongoing, Six (6) cases were assessed and recommendations submitted, five (5) cases are pending; while four (4) cases were sent to the Ministry of Justice for prosecution.

#### III. DIVISION OF EDUCATION AND PREVENTION

The Commission has seen many difficulties in investigating cases of corruption around the Country. Therefore, the Commission has been working to strengthen the Education and Prevention arm to support proactive efforts in the fight against corruption to prevent losses before the long processes of investigation and prosecution.

#### 3.1 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS DURING THE PERIOD UNDER REVIEW

The LACC Act provides for the Division of Education and Prevention to undertake research into the causes, manifestation and dimensions of corruption in Liberia. It also calls on the Division to advice on approaches and practices needed to be adopted by both public and private institutions to prevent corruption.

In view of the foregoing, the Division has been seized with designing and implementing programs to educate the public on the mandate of the Commission, as well as explaining the benefits to be derived from the minimization of corruption.

#### 3.2 UNDP FUNDED PROJECTS:

#### 3.2.1 LACC Launched its Mapping Corruption Risk Report:

During the period under review, specifically on March 12, 2015, the Commission in collaboration with the Ministry of Education, with sponsorship by the UNDP, launched the "Mapping Corruption Risks in the Educational Sector" Report. The study which was sponsored by the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and conducted as a pilot by a National Consultant within Montserrado County, highlighted the level of corruption taking place within the sector and suggested a risk reduction plan to tackle the menace.

#### 3.2.2 GoAL WaSH Water project

In its continuous preventive thrust, the division during the period under review, with funding from the UNDP contracted the professional services of a National Consultant who conducted corruption risks survey in the water sector. The resultant report, according to plan, has been validated with a recommendation for the establishment of a Ministry of Water. Besides, a risk reduction plan has been prepared which the LWSC will pilot while monitoring will be conducted of the implementation by the LACC. This program will promote accountability and integrity in the water and sanitation sector across the Country.

#### 3.2.3 STAOP PROJECT

#### 3.2.3.1 Student Integrity Clubs in Schools

Under the STAOP Project, a UNDP supported initiative; the Commission conducted an assessment of ten (10) high schools in Montserrado County for the purpose of establishing Student Integrity Clubs (SICs). The hoisting of ten bullet boards and the formal establishment of the Student Integrity Clubs (SICs) in the ten assessed public schools could not take place in the first and second quarters of 2014/2015 due to the late signing of the 2015 Annual Work Plan (AWP) of the STAOP Project, subsequent release of funds coupled with the outbreak of the deadly EBOLA VIRUS DISEASE (EVD) thus the activity could not be implemented as planned and is expected to go ahead during the second quarter (October-December) of 2014/2015.

#### **3.2.3.2** Collaboration with Carter Center

With support from the STAOP Project, seventy six heads of line ministries representatives, superintendents, Assistant Superintendents for Development, County Inspectors, managers of various county based projects, and thirty eight (38) members of the Freedom of Information (FOI) Network in four counties were provided information on Corruption Prevention and the Role of the LACC. The county authorities in River Gee, Grand Gedeh, Nimba, and Lofa were provided information on corruption prevention through community town hall meetings and community radio stations by the Education and Prevention Division of the LACC and the Carter Center. The community radio talk shows allowed residents to call in and request information from their leaders on issues of accountability and transparency.

#### 3.2.3.3 UNCAC Assessment

The STAOP Project provided funding which allowed the LACC to recruit the services of a national consultant who visited various integrity institutions and assessed the level to which they have complied with the provisions of the UNCAC in the past. The assessment revealed that albeit some progress was made under chapter, Articles 1 and 9 which deal with the establishment of governance institutions and procurement, there are many articles which have yet to be complied with. The assessment however created a high level of awareness and appreciation of the UNCAC among integrity institutions. The assessment also contributed to the development of an Action Plan which if implemented will contribute significantly to the enhancing transparency and accountability in the public sector.

#### 3.2.3.4. UNCAC Peer Review Mission

The STAOP Project during the period facilitated the participation of two members of the Prosecution Team in the Vienna, Austria. The LACC with support from the STAOP Project has begun to understand and utilize the facilities of the UNCAC to strengthen her ability to fight corruption.

#### 3.2.3.5 Celebration of International Anti-corruption Day

The STAOP Project supported the celebration of International Anti-corruption Day for the year 2014. The interaction between the media, integrity institutions, students, and civil society organizations has contributed significantly to awareness and dialogue on corruption prevention, transparency and accountability. The implementation of activities marking the day leads to increased dialogue and discussion on corruption trends and actions needed to curtail corruption in the society.

#### 4.0 WORLD BANK FUNDED PROJECT

#### **4.1 LACC Holds Partners' Roundtable Conference:**

On March 19, 2015, the Commission, as a way of marketing its three-year (2014-2017) Strategic Plan, held a Partners' Roundtable Conference at the Commission on Gurley Street and U. N Drive. Attendance at the conference included Her Excellency, Ellen Johnson Sirleaf, President of the Republic of Liberia, Dr. Amos C. Sawyer, Chairman of the Governance Commission andmoderator of the event, as well as friendly governments, the donor partners and other stakeholders, including civil society organizations (CSOs) collaborating with the LACC in the fight against corruption.

Specifically, the following named Embassies accredited near Monrovia, Donor partners and fellow stakeholders in the fight against corruption graced the event:

#### **5.0 LACC INITIATIVE**

#### **5.1 Monitoring of EBOLA Resources**

Due to the outbreak of Ebola Virus Disease, the work of the Education & Prevention Division was limited to regular engagement with the media on the Division's Monitoring of Ebola Resources project. A concept note prepared by the LACC was implemented during the period under review while actual field work at the selected Ministries, Agencies and Commissions (MACs) took place.

The below named Ministries, Agencies and Commissions (MACs) which received EBOLA resources were monitored by the LACC and full reports produced and shared with the monitored institutions as mentioned below:

- 1. Ministry of Internal Affairs (MIA);
- 2. Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization (BIN);
- 3. Liberia National Police (LNP); and
- 4. General Service Agency (GSA)

The reports noticed weakness in the management of the EBOLA resources and recommended ways for improving the utilization of future emergency funds/resources. Of the four MACs that received communication from the LACC and cooperated in the monitoring exercise, only the GSA has acknowledged receipt of the LACC report and has accordingly assured of its cooperation in the implementation of the recommendations contained therein.

#### a. Code of Conduct:

The National Code of Conduct (NCoC) governing all public servants was printed into "handbill" in June 2014. In order to give this new law meaning and effect, the LACC, as the lead implementing agency on the National Code of Conduct, along with other relevant and responsible agencies of government and civil society organizations has been working to propose a framework through which the NCoC can be implemented, enforced, monitored, administered and reviewed from time to time. Opwerationally, the LACC, operationally, has not commenced the implementation of asset disclosure exercise in 2015 until the appropriate framework is adopted and launched.

#### IV. DIVISION OF ADMINISTRATION

#### 4.1 KEY ACHIEVEMENTS/EFFORTS UNDER ADMINISTRATION

During the period under review, Administration Division provided overall administrative and logistical support to the Commission. The Division trained staff of the Commission and strengthened internal controls within the Commission.

The Administration Division prepared and submitted to the Public Procurement and Concession Commission, the LACC 2014/2015 cash plan as well as its 2014 procurement plan as required by law.

During the period under review, sixty-five (65) staff of the cCmmission benefitted from training to strengthen the overall human resource capacity of the Commission. Staff also benefitted from training on re-branding the Commission and orientation of personnel of the Commission.

The Administration Division procured a Staff Bus and four additional vehicles for its Vice Chairperson and four Commissioners.

The Commission expresses appreciation to the Government of Liberia (GOL) for having approved a Special Operational Budget of US\$600,000.00 (Six Hundred Thousand United States Dollars) after the passage into law of the 2014/2015 fiscal budget. This boost in the funding of the Commission has enabled it to handle outstanding logistical problems including vehicles for the Enforcement and Investigation Division, Information Communication Technology (ICT) equipment, including hand-held communication gadgets and other essential equipment for the smooth running of the Commission.

During the period under review, the General Auditing Commission (GAC) completed LACC's first Draft Auditor General's Report. Auditing of the Commission for three years (2010/2011, 2011/2012, and 2012/2013) began mid-2014. An Exit Conference is expected soonest between the GAC and the LACC after which a final Auditor General's Report will be released.

#### 4.2 <u>Training</u>

Three staff of the Division successfully completed their Master in Anti-Corruption Studies (MACS) at the International Anti-Corruption Academy (IACA) in Laxenburg, Austria.

#### 4.3 Income, Asset and Liabilities Declaration

During the reporting period, a total of four hundred and eighteen (418) public officials declared their assets (See appendix).

#### 4.4 Attendance at National and International Conferences

During the period under review, staff of the Commission attended several national and international conferences, seminars and workshops. A total of three (3) employees benefited from training and meetings.

#### 4.5 Challenges of the Administration Division

The Administration Division has its own share of problems as it provides administrative and logistical support to the other program divisions.

Budgetary allocations for the Commission since its establishment have been low thereby making it difficult for the LACC to fully execute its mandate. The low budgetary allocations barely enable the Commission to fund program activities after underwriting remuneration for commissioners and staff. Also, most of the vehicles in the LACC fleet of vehicles have outlived their useful life span, and this challenge is sometime further compounded by limited or no disbursements for repair and vehicle maintenance.

However, The Commission can report under this period that it has been plagued with series of financial difficulties. The below matrix is a comparative requests and receipts analysis to give you an appreciation of the financial challenge the LACC is enduring:
